## From the Head of College

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

Welcome to the opening term of 2016 at Waverley College. The College community – the Pre-School, the Junior School and the Senior School - has much to be proud of as we look back on the achievements of 2015 and it is with great anticipation that we look forward to the year ahead.

As a community, will continue to implement our Strategy as we anticipate the opening of our new facilities at the end of Term 1. In commencing the College year, I wish to draw your attention to important information and a number of key expectations.

### 2015 HSC Results

Waverley College has continued its successful performance in the Higher School Certificate. We are extremely proud of the diversity of our student body and the achievements of all our students.

From a total of 835 examinations attempted, 9.58% of scores were in Band 6, 46.95% of scores in Bands 5 and 6 and 85.03% of scores were in Bands 4, 5 and 6.

Excellent results were achieved in all Key Learning Areas. Congratulations to Adam Hegedus who was awarded First in State for Studies of Religion II. Adam also achieved the top ATAR of 99.85 followed by Ben Delaney on 99.60.

Waverley College featured in the SMH Subject Merit List for Mathematics and English and the SMH Course Merit List with Ben Delaney 9th in state for Studies of Religion II, Thomas Miletich 15th in state for Modern History and Adam Hegedus 15th in state for Business Studies.

Adam Hegedus, Ben Delaney and Alessandro Piovano were included in the Premier's All-Rounders List.

80 results appeared in the Board of Studies Distinguished Achievers List.

39 students achieved an ATAR of 85 or above.

Further information on University and TAFE entrance will be provided to the Waverley community early in Term 1.

Congratulations to Year 12 2015, their families and the staff who supported their HSC journey.

College function has priority over any other commitment. Given that all these events are communicated well in advance it is unfair for parents to place their son in a position that compromises them.

Attendance by students at the Annual May Procession is of the highest priority. I would ask that all families ensure that the first Sunday in May is cleared of all other commitments. Exemptions from this day are rarely granted. College Sport / Co-curricular activities are another of these commitments and a separate letter will be sent in relation to this. Functions such as the CAS Swimming or CAS Athletics are further examples. Should there be difficulty with attendance at such events, an application for exemption must be made directly to the Head of College with two weeks notice. This lead-in time is needed to process applications. Applications received within the week prior to a Saturday Sport may not receive authorisation. All unauthorised absences from compulsory events will result in an appropriate College sanction. The Head of College does not automatically grant permission.

### **Holiday & Leave Requests**

Parents are reminded that there is an expectation that students are at school for the entire term as gazetted in the school diary and calendar. Please remember that:

- We publish our term times well in advance so that you can make correct holiday bookings.
- We enjoy more vacation time than most schools in the Sydney Metropolitan Area.
- Our school program determines that the students work right up to the end of the term.

Please note that your son's involvement in all College activities is part of the agreement made by parents and students at the time of enrolment. When students are absent (with or without approval) this is recorded on their file and will be reviewed at appropriate times (eg. Commencement of Year 9 or Year 11).

### **Smoking, Alcohol, Drugs, Use of Technology**

As I am sure you are aware, the College has strong policies and sanctions relating to these areas. Please read the appropriate the Deputy Head's section of this letter for further information. I would ask that you discuss these matters with your son. The most serious breaches in any of these areas may result in the forfeiture of a student's enrolment.

## **From the Deputy Head of College**

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

Welcome to the 2016 Academic School Year. I look forward to meeting many of you in the coming weeks. I have included in this article some important 'start up' of year information points and policy information.

### **Policies**

The College policies need to be taken seriously by all as they will ensure the community as a whole is advantaged and individuals are provided with a safe environment to learn, play, work and teach. Policies and procedures are also designed to teach the boys valuable life lessons that will assist them develop skills that employers look for and also to ensure they are responsible productive members of society.

Greater detail of the College policies is located in the Student Diary which every boy will receive on day 1. The diary can be used as a form of communication between parents and staff and as such should not have any graffiti or stickers inside it. Parents are requested to sign the student diaries once a week.

The following is a snapshot of our policies and procedures.

### **Discrimination, Harassment & Bullying Policy**

There is no place for discrimination, harassment or bullying at Waverley. The College seeks to provide an inclusive community for students, staff and parents. The College recognises the benefits to individuals and the organisation of a diverse community. As such, the College expects students, staff and parents to behave consistently with its values and to treat others with respect and without bias.

**Discrimination** occurs in the School community when a person is treated less favourably than other students because of their i) disability, ii) race, iii) age, iv) gender or v) religion. (This list is not exhaustive.)

**Harassment** is any type of behaviour that is i) unwelcome, ii) targets a person because of their disability, race, age or gender, iii) would offend or intimidate a reasonable person. Harassment usually consists of a pattern of unwelcome behaviour. However, it can also consist of one act where the act is of a serious nature. Some forms of harassment are also criminal offences.

**Bullying** is any type of behaviour that harms, intimidates, threatens, victimises, undermines, offends, degrades or humiliates a member of the community. Examples of bullying may be physical (swearing, shouting, name calling, blocking someone's path) or psychological (deliberately ignoring, excluding, withholding information or publishing something online or on social media - cyberbullying) Please visit our Website under 'How to stay safe online'. There is no place for cyberbullying within our community.

If you discriminate, harass or bully, you will be held responsible for your actions under the rules of the College. Parents will be informed and involved in this process. Some acts of discrimination, harassment and bullying are illegal and therefore may bring the involvement of outside agencies. Proven breaches of this policy can result in, but are not limited to, any one or more of the following: (i) disciplinary action, (ii) suspension, (iii) exclusion (iv) notification to an external agency (eg police).

There is no room for physical violence in any circumstances from any of our students. The College supports one punch can kill initiatives and non violent resolution to problems.

### Illicit and Restricted Substances

Drugs, whether they be illicit or restricted legal drugs such as tobacco and alcohol are expressly forbidden.

This policy also extends to students using or providing prescription drugs to unauthorised persons. Parents must register with the College any prescription drugs their son is required to bring to school. Students are not permitted to self-administer prescription medication.

There is zero tolerance with this policy, it is unacceptable in all circumstances for a student to buy, sell, be in possession or use restricted or illicit drugs while at school, on the way to school or at any school event during the year. Students need to be aware that there is mandatory reporting to police around these activities.

People under the age of 18 (minors) are not allowed to buy, sell, possess or drink alcohol on licensed premises or public areas. The College strongly encourages parents to not run or support parties where alcohol is served to minors. Parents risk 'secondary supply' of alcohol prosecution which carries a \$11000 fine or 12 months imprisonment (or both).

Smoking is prohibited by students at all times including their journey to and from school, and at all school organised activities (day, evening or holiday times). Parents and visitors are reminded that the campus is a smoke free environment and that it is illegal to smoke within 8 metres of any school campus in Australia.

### Personal Electronic Devices

Mobile phones may be carried by students but only be used with teacher permission and only for learning purposes. (E.G. taking photo of work, experiment, performance.) Students are not permitted to make calls, text and the like during class and learning time. A seven day confiscation will apply for this type of breach. Likewise, inappropriate use of the internet and websites will lead to serious sanctions.

Students are not allowed to record (video or photo) staff or fellow students without the person's direct permission. This would be considered a serious invasion of a person's privacy and rights and can lead to enrolment being terminated. The same goes for sexting or distributing lewd photos. Students and parents should be aware that Police can prosecute for these actions.

### Valuables

Students are strongly advised to not bring valuables to school such as MP3 players, game consoles, iPads, iPods, cameras, portable speakers, large sums of cash and the like. The school

takes no responsibility if any such items are misplaced, lost or stolen. Students who bring them to school do so at their own risk and the College does not have insurance cover for such items.

### Fire Evacuation

In the event of a fire or smoke all students and staff will need to evacuate the building and move to the Lower Recreation Area. In the event that the Lower Recreation Area is unavailable, our alternative evacuation point is Waverley Park.

When evacuating each building:

- move quickly and quietly under the directions of your teacher
- Senior School should move directly to the perimeter of the campus using either Birrell Street or Salisbury Street to reach the Lower Recreation Area
- Junior School should move via Henrietta Street
- all visitors to the College will also need to evacuate to the Lower Recreation Area.

### Lockdown Procedure

In some circumstances it is not advisable to evacuate from a building, but rather to stay inside and out of harm's way (eg. storm, gas leak, terrorist threat, intruder on campus). In these situations lockdown procedures will be enacted. The signal to let the community know of this will be the playing of the national anthem.

If students are in class, remain there with your teacher, get out of sight and lock the door.

If students are outside class, during a break or between classes, then move into to the nearest building and stay out of sight.

All visitors to the College must also proceed to the nearest building and stay out of sight.

Do not use mobile phones during a lockdown procedure.

Once the lockdown is over, an 'all clear' will be given by either the Head of College, Deputy Head or member of the executive.

### Start of Year Information

Every boy will receive a wall and pocket calendar to assist with organisation. Boys will also receive textbooks (if applicable), ebooks, a new padlock and key (Year 7), and stationery packs (7 & 8).

### Lockers & Security Padlocks

The College provides each student with access to a locker that has a secure internal compartment. This locker should be kept clean and secure at all times. The College has a master

keying system which is the only approved locking mechanism. Students who lose, misplace or damage their padlock must have it replaced and costs will be placed on parents/guardians school account.

### Book Hire (Years 7-12 only)

**Year 12** - Students already have their textbooks and must provide their own stationery.

**Year 9 / 10 / 11** - Students will be issued with textbooks in Week 1 and must organise their own stationery

**Year 8** - Students will be issued textbooks and a stationery pack on their first day. The stationery pack is debited to the Term One account.

### Books & Equipment

Students will be informed by their teachers what specific materials they require for each subject. However, on the first day, students should bring:

- At least 2 X A4 books or folders with A4 paper (Year 8-12)
- Pens/ pencils/ ruler/ pencil case/ (no whiteout, texta or permanent pens are permitted)
- All clothes and other items should be clearly labelled with the student's name
- College bag with name on it

### Good Habits

**Sleep** - One of the most valuable areas that you can support your son in is ensuring he gets enough sleep. Sleep is food for the brain and allows the body to replenish itself. A lack of sleep will limit your ability to learn, listen, concentrate and solve problems. The school has adopted a sleep mode across all of its

student Apple Mac computers where the device will go to bed at the following times to encourage good sleep patterns.

- Year 7 & 8 - (10:30pm – 5:30am)
- Year 9 & 10 - (10:30pm – 5:30am)
- Year 11 & 12 - (12:00am – 5:30am)

The College realises that students have access to other devices, please encourage your son not be on devices just prior to bedtime. This time should be dedicated to reading a book of his choice.

**Breakfast** - Significant numbers of children in Australia are not having enough to eat at breakfast time and this is affecting their performance at school. This is particularly important for growing boys, so please ensure your son starts the day well and has enough sustenance throughout his day to keep him fuelled up and learning.

### Homework

Get your son into good study habits early. The College recommends the following indicative times for homework / study / reading per week. These times do not include internet cruising, etc.

Year 5.....	30 to 45 minutes
Year 6.....	45 minutes to one hour
Years 7 & 8.....	One and a quarter hours
Year 9.....	One and a half hours
Year 10.....	Two hours (six times a week)
Years 11 & 12.....	Three hours (six times a week)

## WAVERLEY COLLEGE - STUDENT AGREEMENT AND COMMITMENT

At the commencement of each school year parents, carers, guardians and students are reminded of the agreement to which each person is required to commit as a condition of continuing enrolment at the college.

The agreement is detailed below and can also be found in the student diary and calendar:

### Student Agreement

I agree to the following conditions relevant to my acceptance as a continuing student at Waverley College:

- I recognise and accept the aims of the school as a Catholic School and will support its religious practices and programs.
- I agree that my education at Waverley and the education of others is paramount. I therefore understand I need to dedicate myself to all aspects of the academic, spiritual and physical programs offered by the College by committing to working with my teachers to achieve my best in all things.
- I agree that it is of the utmost importance that I respect the dignity of other persons - students and teachers, alike. I understand that rudeness, bullying in any form, uncivil language and unruliness are unacceptable behavior. Likewise, I realise that stealing is unacceptable and a serious breach of school regulations. My conduct will at all times be marked by politeness, common sense, and respect for others.
- Realising the harmful nature of unlawful drugs, dangerous weapons, alcohol and smoking, I agree to abide by the regulations which forbid their use and /or possession: on my way to and from school / at school / on excursions, retreats, socials or any school based activity.
- I agree to wear the full correct Waverley uniform, and to take pride in it. If, on a particular day I am unable to wear any part of the uniform, I will present my teacher with a note from my parents, dated and signed. I understand that the blue and yellow striped t-shirt and the College tracksuit are the only acceptable alternatives (Senior school). I realise the reputation of the College rests in part on the neatness and good grooming of its students. I accept the School's decision on what is acceptable.
- I will ensure that my conduct while travelling to and from school is exemplary at all times.
- I will accept the rules and discipline of the College and abide by the directions given for the good management of the College. I will abide by all regulations pertaining to the use of all Personal Electronic Devices including but not restricted to laptops, mobile phones, MP3 players, computers and the internet.
- I will endeavour to do my best and use all my talents for the College and myself and will foster a sense of community spirit in the College by participating in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- I agree to place my commitment to JSHAA / CAS and other Co-curricular (eg Debating) before any commitment I may

have to a club sport / activity outside of the College or to any part-time work commitments. I will participate in / be present (if required) at the usual school activities such as CAS events, Swimming, Athletics, Parent/Teacher/Student evenings and interviews, Concerts etc;

- Should I miss any work or assessment item for any reason, it is my responsibility to find out what the work was and complete it by the new date set by the teacher. I will abide by all College policies regarding assessment procedures.
- I accept that the educational aims of Waverley College are spiritual, physical, intellectual, emotional and social and that to assist the school in achieving these I need to participate in all of these to my fullest.
